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2022 Ohio Election Guide November 9, 2022

The contentious 2022 elections concluded yesterday with Ohioans going to the polls to elect a new US Senator, all statewide elected officials, members of the congressional delegation, state legislators, and judges. An election year that saw multiple unresolved lawsuits over legislative district lines and two primary elections, ended with Republicans retaining a seat in the US Senate, adding to their already significant majorities in the Ohio General Assembly, retaining all statewide offices, and winning all three Ohio Supreme Court seats. Democrats did well in the toss-up races for Ohio's delegation to the US House of Representatives.

Governor

In the race for Governor, Mike DeWine defeated former Dayton Mayor Nan Whaley with relative ease. He secured 63% of the vote to 37% for Whaley. The victory, in what is likely to be his final campaign for public office, will ensure that DeWine can end his 40-year career in public service with one final four-year term as Governor.

US Senate

In a US Senate race that appeared close for most of the campaign, Republican J.D. Vance prevailed 54% to 46% over Congressman Tim Ryan. Vance will replace retiring Senator Rob Portman.

Ohio Supreme Court

There were three Ohio Supreme Court races decided yesterday and the Republican candidates won all three seats in an election where the ballot included the party affiliation for Supreme Court candidates for the first time. The current Supreme Court includes 4 Republicans and 3 Democrats, and that same margin will continue after Governor DeWine appoints a replacement for the newly elected Chief Justice Sharon Kennedy.

- Kennedy defeated Democrat Jennifer Brunner for Chief Justice, but Brunner retains her current seat on the court.
- Republican Pat Fischer defeated challenger Teri Jamison.
- Republican Pat DeWine defeated Marilyn Zayas.



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Other Statewide Races

All four Republican incumbents in the races for attorney general, secretary of state, treasurer and state auditor secured an additional four years in office.

- Attorney General Dave Yost easily defeated Democratic state Rep. Jeff Crossman by a margin of 61%-39%.
- Secretary of State Frank LaRose won reelection over Democratic Forest Park City Council member Chelsea Clark with a margin of 60%-39%, with independent candidate Terpsehore Maras receiving 1% of the vote.
- Ohio Treasurer Robert Sprague was re-elected with 59% of the vote, defeating Democratic Marion Mayor Scott Schertzer who received 41%.
- State Auditor Keith Faber defeated Democratic Nelsonville City Auditor Taylor Sappington 59%-41%.

General Assembly

All 99 seats of the Ohio House of Representatives were on the ballot across Ohio yesterday. Representatives can run for four two-year terms before being required to leave the House due to term limits.

Because of those term limits, early resignations, the effects of redistricting, and some upsets of incumbents, 28 new members were elected to the House of Representatives yesterday. In the Next General Assembly, Republicans will add to their already strong majority in the House with a 68-31 advantage.

Current Speaker of the House, Bob Cupp, is among the House members who are departing at the end of 2022 due to term limits. The race for the next Speaker is ongoing and will be a focus of legislators when they return to the Statehouse later this month.

Some key results from yesterday's House elections:

- Incumbent House member Thomas West (D-Canton) was defeated by Republican Jim Thomas 54%-46% in the 49th District in Stark County.
- Rep. Richard Brown (D-Canal Winchester) is locked in a race with Ronald Beach in Franklin County that could go either way once the provisional ballots and late



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arriving absentee ballots are counted. The unofficial results show Beach currently defeating the incumbent by just 96 votes.

- Rep. Andrea White (R-Kettering) was re-elected in a very competitive district in Montgomery County, defeating Addison Caruso 51%-49%.
- Rep. Derek Merrin (R-Monclova Township) faced a tough re-election in a new district in Lucas County but prevailed 54%-46%.
- In Cuyahoga County, Rep. Daniel Troy (D-Willowick) won an extremely close reelection contest, defeating George Phillips 51%-49%.
- Rep. Jessica Miranda (D-Forest Park) won re-election in Hamilton County with 52% of the vote, defeating her Republican opponent, Chris Monzel.
- Rep. Gail Pavliga (R-Atwater) defeated former Rep. Kathleen Clyde in a competitive race in Portage County 51%-49%.
- Reps. Phil Plummer (R-Dayton), Gayle Manning (R-North Ridgeville), and Al Cutrona (R-Canfield), all faced competitive elections in toss-up districts, and all were victorious by comfortable margins.

Every four years, half of the members of the Ohio Senate are up for re-election. Senators may run for two four-year terms. Seven new members were elected to the Senate yesterday and many of those new senators are current members of the Ohio House. In the end, Republicans added one additional seat to their current majority and will now control the Ohio Senate by a margin of 26-7.

Key results in the Senate included:

- State Senator Tina Maharath (D-Columbus) faced a challenge from Republican Michelle Reynolds in the 3rd Senate District that slightly leans in favor of the Democrats. Reynolds defeated Maharath by a vote of 53%-47%.
- Another close Senate race occurred in the 27th District in Summit County.
 Senator Kristina Roegner (R-Hudson) ran in a newly drawn district that was considered a toss-up. She faced Democrat Patricia Goetz and Senator Roegner ended up winning re-election with a vote of 51%-49%.
- After surviving his primary election challenge, Sen. Nathan Manning (R-North Ridgeville) had more work to do to return to the Ohio Senate for a second term. He faced Democrat Anthony Eliopoulos in the general election in an extremely competitive district. Manning ended up winning easily with a margin of 58%-42%.



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US Congress

New congressional district lines led to some competitive races and impressive wins for the Democrat candidates in the most closely watched contests. The 15-member Ohio congressional delegation will include 10 Republicans and 5 Democrats.

- In Hamilton County, longtime US Congressman Steve Chabot (R-Cincinnati) faced another tough election in a newly drawn district. The district was considered a toss-up and Chabot was defeated in a very close election by Democrat and Cincinnati City Councilman Greg Landsman.
- Another competitive Congressional race was expected in the evenly divided 9th District, where another long serving member of the Ohio congressional delegation, Toledo's Marcy Kaptur, faced political newcomer J.R. Majewski in a completely different district than that one Congresswoman Kaptur currently represents. Kaptur prevailed by a comfortable margin on a vote of 57%-43%.
- A final congressional race that was closely watched was in the 13th District in Summit County. This was an open seat in a newly drawn district that only slightly favors the Democrats. Former Ohio House Minority Leader Emilia Sykes (D-Akron) defeated Madison Gesiotto Gilbert Gilbert on a vote of 53% to 47%.
